

The two-phase project saw the completion of Phase I this fall which consisted on the planting of 62 trees along the perimeter of the square – a variety of okanese poplars, amur maples, and red osier dogwood. Planting beds will also be added to provide buffer for sitting benches and picnic tables. Twenty-two Grade 7 students from the Buffalo Narrows High School along with Home Hardware staff and the town maintenance staff were present at the planting event.

Over 30 students from London District Christian Secondary School participated in the planting and worked together alongside Home Hardware staff and UTRCA staff to plant 100 native trees. Trees will improve air and water quality, provide wildlife habitat and food, shade, increase natural vegetation, educate the community and provide a connection to other trees in an adjacent park.

A total of 46 native species were planted in the schoolgrounds with one ceremonial tree being planted by the students.
